My trip to the Mltty

Let me start by saying that reports of my demise have, for the most part, been exaggerated. I was posting some of my adventures last month of my trip down south but for whatever reason I stopped. So as I was saying:

I left my home in Warwick RI on Tuesday April 22 and drove to the town of Front Royal VA, the start of Skyline Drive. It was 470 miles of very boring highway driving. Up early the next morning and headed out on the Skyline Drive. Such a wonderful road, 105 miles through the entire length of the National Park Service's Shenandoah National Park which is in the Blue Ridge Mountains. A good portion of it runs right along the top of a ridge with wonderful vistas on both sides. There are lots of elevation changes and twists and turns, just ideal for driving a little British sports car.



After about three hours I drove off the Skyline Drive right onto the Blue Ridge Parkway. I didn't think the SLD could get any better but

the BRPW might just have it beat. The speed limit on SLD is 35 mph. For most of the drive that was fine but the BRPW is 45 mph which makes a big difference. The Blue Ridge Parkway is 470 miles running from VA down beyond Asheville NC. It was built by the



Works Progress Administration, starting construction in 1935, to keep people working during the depression. We have the pleasure of enjoying it today. Like SLD, a lot of it runs up along the ridges but other times you are down in the valleys. Wherever you are, it's just fantastic driving and viewing. The problem is that I wanted to stop at every scenic overlook to take pictures. After stopping three times I just had to knock it off, I'd never get to my destination! After 105 miles on the SLD and about 330 miles on the BRPW I was detoured off and finally made it to Asheville NC for the night.

Thursday morning I was off for a two hour drive to the legendary Tail of the Dragon. Also known as Deals Gap, this is an 11 mile section of country road that starts in NC and runs into Tennessee. Unlike most other country roads, the Tail has 318 turns on it. Not just turns but switchbacks, big changes of elevations, hairpins and every other kind of driving challenge you can think of! I was going to drive it conservatively but that lasted for about a quarter mile. You can't help zipping around the corners one after another. After completing the north drive I turned around, took the top down and started the drive south. Now that I knew what I was in store for I was ready. Zipping back and forth around the corners as they constantly come at you was very challenging and loads of fun! By this

time there were some professional photographers along the way taking pictures of cars as they go by. No time to look and wave, full concentration on the road. One thing that has to be done on the TOTD, you have to stay in your lane at all times. This is a huge attraction for motorcyclists, and some die on this road every year. You can't see anything as you come around most of the turns. I was there early in the morning and didn't see another car till half way through the run south. I understand that it can become very congested at times.



After that I stopped in at the Tail of the Dragon Motorcycle Resort, had breakfast, bought the tee shirt and I was off to Road Atlanta and the Mitty. Some wonderful back roads brought me to the track at about 3:00. Set up camp, had a few beers, got a good night's sleep and was up early the next morning to watch some vintage racing. I signed up for a track tour, which is another name for "you give me \$50.00 and you get to go on the track for 20 minutes." Sounds good to me! I was at Road Atlanta last year and had gotten out on the track so I knew what it was about. This was supposed to be a relatively low speed drive but as you can imagine, it ain't!



Driving slowly some of the time and just all out for the rest of the time, I felt like the car was turning at 5000 rpm's for most of the time, brakes were screaming, but what fun! After that I started thinking of the long drive back. Last year I did the 15 hours all at once, I wasn't going to do that this year. I packed my tent up and drove 5 hours to Roanoke VA, up the next morning for the 10 hours back to RI. About 2380 miles door to door, car ran great, no rain except for the last 2 hours going through CT and I had a great time.

They say we should drive these old cars so let's get out there and drive them!

Rally 'Round the Quabbin

Speaking of getting out and driving our LBC's, the Quabbin ride, organized by Tony and Diane Rhodes was great fun. There were about 26 cars that came along for the tour. The weather was sunny and a little warm, but there were lots of winding, tree lined roads that provided shady spots along the way. We stopped at the Hardwick winery for some refreshments, then onto a picnic by the Quabbin tower, a photo stop along the shore, and lastly dessert at the Very Berry Frozen Yogurt shop in Belchertown. 
